THS Music Department Handbook

Welcome to the Tahquitz High School Music Department. Music is an activity for the most dedicated students. You are expected to demonstrate outstanding behavior, punctuality, maturity, and regular practice. In order for you and the music department to succeed, there are specific guidelines in the handbook that must be followed. It is expected that you read and know all the information found within.

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My Goals

- Teach every student how to play their instrument.
- Build the Tahquitz music department into a program that the students and community are proud of and the surrounding communities admire.
- Teach students how to be successful in music, school, and life through attributes of respect, responsibility, critical thinking, time management, leadership, and punctuality.

Equipment and Supplies

All students are expected to come prepared to every rehearsal and performance with the following items:

Woodwinds: 4 reeds (in good condition), cork grease, and cleaning kit (flutes only cleaning kit)

Brass: Valve oil, cleaning kit, and tuning slide grease/spray

Percussion: Sticks and drum pad

All Students: Instruments, music, worksheets, pencils and lyre/flip folder (marching students).

Behavior and Expectations

The two most important attributes of a successful student are **respect** and **responsibility**. These attributes will not only lead to personal growth and success, but also the success of the entire music program. The following are rules for the Tahquitz Music Department.

- **Being on Time:** In the classroom with your phone in the parking lot and actively getting your instrument, chair, music stand, music, and pencil out when the bell rings.
- **Being Prepared:** Arriving to class with your instrument, music, and pencil every day.
- **Being Respectful:** Attentively listening and focusing on whoever is speaking and treating others with kindness.
- **Being Responsible:** Arriving to class ready to learn with all music prepared.
- 1. Always be respectful and responsible.
- 2. Keep the music room clean.
- 3. No gum or food, except bottled water, is allowed in the classroom.
- 4. Cell Phones are to be parked in the parking lot before class starts each day.
- 5. Airpods, headphones, etc must be put away before class starts.
- 6. No hoodies, hats, or sunglasses are to be worn during class.
- 7. When you enter the music room, immediately take your seat and begin a sensible warm up. (You will be instructed on how to do this).
- 8. When Mr. Pietsch steps up on the podium or in front of you, please come to attention.
- 9. Always use good body and instrument posture.
- 10. Never let anyone else handle or play your instrument.
- 11. Be responsible for your music. Keep it in your folder and in your backpack or locker at all times-do not keep it in your case.
- 12. When rehearsal is over, put your instrument, music, and music stand away and return to your seat.
- 13. My office, desks, and storage are off limits without permission.
- 14. You are expected to have your instrument and music for every rehearsal. Repetitive failure to do so will result in grade reduction and could result in termination of your music participation.
- 15. No studying or doing homework for other classes during class, unless instructed to do so.
- 16. You are not to leave the classroom unless it is an emergency.
- 17. If you do leave or enter the classroom, do so in a discrete manner.
- 18. The bell or clock does NOT excuse you, Mr. Pietsch does.

CONSEQUENCES

If problems do occur, the following is the order of consequences that will be taken unless the problems require immediate parent involvement or suspension.

1st Occurrence: Verbal Warning 2nd Occurrence: One-on-one Talk

3rd Occurrence: Call Home/Work/Cell phone of Parent(s)

4th Occurrence: Referral to the Office

5th Occurrence: Parent/Teacher Conference

6th Occurrence: Suspension from the music department

PERFORMANCES AND REHEARSALS

Since we are a musical group, performances and rehearsals are a very important part of our learning and growing experience. Performances are the goal that we work towards. In order to do the best job possible in any performance it is important that all Music Department members attend and participate in all of the rehearsals and performances. All members must arrange with their parents/guardians/teachers to be on time for rehearsals/performances. **Missing any performance or rehearsals is unacceptable and unexcused, unless it is a family or medical emergency.** It is your responsibility to know when our performances are and plan ahead (you can find all dates on the band website). If you discover that you must miss a performance or rehearsal you and your parent must notify Mr. Pietsch as far in advance as possible (2 week minimum) explaining why you will miss the performance. **I then will determine if the reason is valid and will assign a written assignment (usually a 3-4 page report) in lieu of the performance at a maximum earning of 70% of the performance.**

Poor academic performance or classroom actions in any of his/her other classes can result in the student to be withdrawn from the program either on a temporary or permanent basis. Reinstating students will be a decision made by Mr. Pietsch, the student's subject teacher, and parents on a case-by-case basis.

PERFORMANCE ATTIRE

Every student must wear all standard attire for every performance. It must be clean, presentable, and pressed. Hair must be worn up and off the collar of the uniform jacket (marching band only). No extreme cosmetics are to be worn while in uniform especially during performances. Jewelry is not to be worn at any performance (including bracelets and visible watches-marching band). Shoes must be polished and shined. Students who fail to follow the attire and grooming policy will not be allowed to perform. If you have any questions regarding your performance attire, please consult Mr. Pietsch at least one week before any performance to verify acceptability. Take pride in your appearance.

MARCHING BAND

1. UNIFORM- Always transport your uniform on a hanger in the uniform bag provided. If allowed to change out of uniform, students must not allow the uniform to touch the ground. When not wearing your uniform, it must be stored on a hanger. Should the uniform become wet due to rain, allow the uniform to air dry before storing it in your uniform bag. The uniform cannot not be worn except during THS Marching Band performances. The uniforms will be collected at announced times at the end of the season. Each member is financially responsible for any damage or lost parts of the uniform. Please check buttons often and sew as necessary. Along with the marching uniform, students must wear black socks and black shoes. If students do not have required socks, they will wear loner socks. If students refuse, by signing this paper you authorize me to spray paint their shoes and socks. While in uniform, water is the ONLY beverage allowed. When in the football stands, the complete uniform must be worn unless otherwise directed. Sunglasses are not permitted unless otherwise directed. If

- shakoes are not worn, they are to be carried in the left hand and the instrument in the right.
- UNIFORM T-SHIRT-To be worn underneath the uniform coat AT ALL TIMES. In addition, we may schedule events that will make the T-shirt the "OFFICIAL" uniform for the event.

CONCERT BAND/SYMPHONIC BAND/BEGINNING BAND/PERCUSSION ENSEMBLE

The following is the required dress code for all concert band performances.

Men: Black button down long sleeve shirt, black slacks (not black jeans), black socks, black dress shoes (not tennis shoes), and a tie of your choosing (school appropriate).

Women: Black blouse (long or short sleeved-the sleeve must reach past the cuff or your shoulder) with black dress pants (not black jeans, stretchy pants, or spandex), and black dress shoes (black sandals are okay but flip flops are NOT).

JAZZ BAND I

The following is the required dress code for all Jazz Band I performers.

Men/Women: Black button down long sleeve shirt, green vest (checked out from Mr. Pietsch), black slacks (not black jeans, stretchy pants, or spandex), black socks and black dress shoes (not tennis shoes).

JAZZ BAND II

The following is the required dress code for all Jazz Band II performers.

Men/Women: Black button down long sleeve shirt, black slacks (not black jeans, stretchy pants, or spandex), black socks, black dress shoes (not tennis shoes), and green bowtie (checked out from Mr. Pietsch).

Fundraisers

Fundraisers are the best way for your child to raise money for the end of the year trip and festivals. It is essential that every student participates in every fundraiser in order to allow the band raise the required funds to trips, festivals, and supplies. There will be multiple fundraisers during the year each with their own profit margin.

Grading

The final grade will be made up of

- 1. **Performances (30%)** are 100 points each. It is the responsibility for each student to arrive on time, be dressed in performance attire, and stay until dismissed. If a student arrives late, they will automatically be deducted 15%. This grading procedure will be used for students who arrive on time but are not dressed or prepared. If a student leaves prior to dismissal, the student will lose 30% of their performance grade. All students must stay through the entire performance and until *everything* is put away. *If a student misses a performance without being excused, their FINAL SEMESTER GRADE will drop 1 letter grade for every missed performance.*
- 2. Playing and Written tests/quizzes (50%) will be given on a weekly or biweekly schedule. The total points will vary depending on the size of the performance section and number of questions.
- 3. **Rehearsal Skills(10%)** will be made up of attendance, participation, and sectionals in class.
- 4. Homework (10%)
 - a. Practice Skills Logs are worth 5 points. To receive full credit, practice logs must be turned in every Friday at the beginning of the period on Friday. Practice logs may not be turned in late unless the student is absent on the due date, upon which the practice log must be turned in the following Monday. Incomplete practice logs will result in only half credit.

Practice Log Grading Scale

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131+ minutes = 6 (extra credit)

120-130 minutes = 5

100-119 minutes = 4

70-99 minutes = 3

50-69 minutes = 2

1-39 minutes = 1

0 minutes = 0

Awards and Achievements

Students are able to earn their letterman's music letter and patches upon meeting the following qualifications. In order to earn each achievement and award, students must be able to complete each semester in band with an 80% or higher, have no unexcused absences from performances, and have no severe discipline issues. Semesters do not need to be consecutive but it is necessary to meet the required expectations to receive all possible awards and achievements. A Note to Parents

Band Lockers

Students are given band lockers to keep their instruments in if they choose. A lock is checked out to each student for their Band Locker.

The Importance of Home Practice

Home practice is the beneficial way for your child to earn a high grade. Your support, encouragement, and guidance will be the key factors in establishing the practice schedule ensuring the attainment of their musical goals.

The most effective home rehearsal programs are based on a minimum daily twenty to thirty minute routine dedicated to quality practice. It is suggested that you and your child mutually agree on a practice time and special area of your home that is designated as their area of musical study. (Mine was the living room.) Every effort should be made to establish a disciplined pattern, which is encouraged and acknowledged by you. A final five to ten minute recital of the new material to family members is always effective in building performance responsibilities. Every musician enjoys the opportunity to display his/her talents. Remember, positive reinforcement is the most effective communication you can share in this important quest.

It is vital to develop the personal discipline, which makes home practice a natural part of the day. Although many new concepts will be taught during the music rehearsals, the limited time does not afford the personal attention, which is vital in developing technical facility required for the

upcoming years of musical growth. The cooperative efforts of the director, the student musician, and the willing parents constitute the proven recipe for success.

Music means more to your child than just playing an instrument. It offers an opportunity to experience a new level of communication. This artistic language will be with them for a lifetime. These formative years of music education can open up a world of aesthetic possibilities that will bring a new meaning to the growth and development of your child. Please create a disciplined practice schedule early in their musical career to ensure these positive results.

If you would rather purchase your own instrument, here are some things to think about when purchasing instruments:

- Instruments that are old or hand me down can often be great. Just bring it in for me to inspect and determine what kind of repairs or tune-ups may be necessary for acceptable performance.
- 2. Instruments bought from retail stores such as Sears, Costco, Target, or Wal-Mart may be more inexpensive than music stores, but these instruments are FAR more shoddily put together and usually break often requiring multiple expensive repairs by an instrumental repair shop; so I strongly DO NOT recommend these.
- 3. Please do not go out and buy a top of the line instrument. So many things can change in the course of a very short time. Plus, during a student's first couple years in band, a lot of "breakage" can take place. Many music stores have a guarantee that while you are renting from them, any repair you need is fully paid for and included in the rental price.
- 4. You may also ask the music store for the option of "RENT TO OWN," which allows you to make monthly installments without any interest in order to purchase your instrument.

Remind-Text Alerts

I use Remind to help students and parents know about important activities and events via text messages. All you need to do is text the below message to the number below. Once you have done that you will be set to receive the texts. I not only encourage my students to use Remind, but I also encourage you the parents to also. I will only use it for important events.

Each instrumental group has its own Remind code. Please see the website for instructions.
